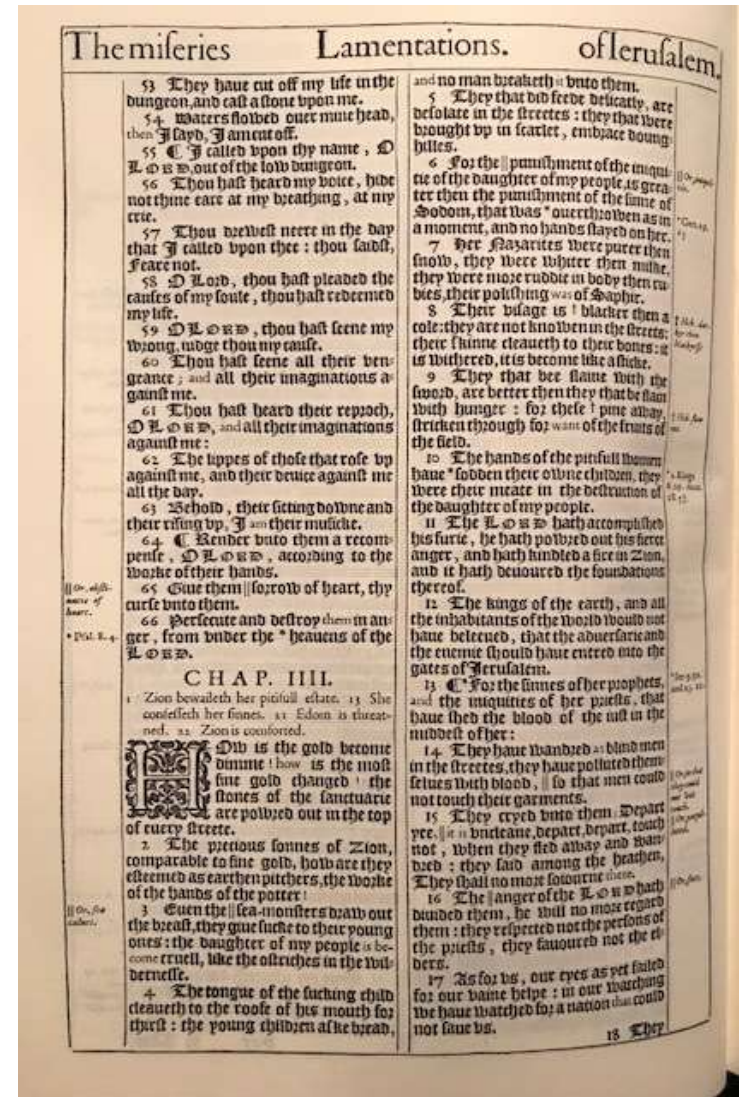

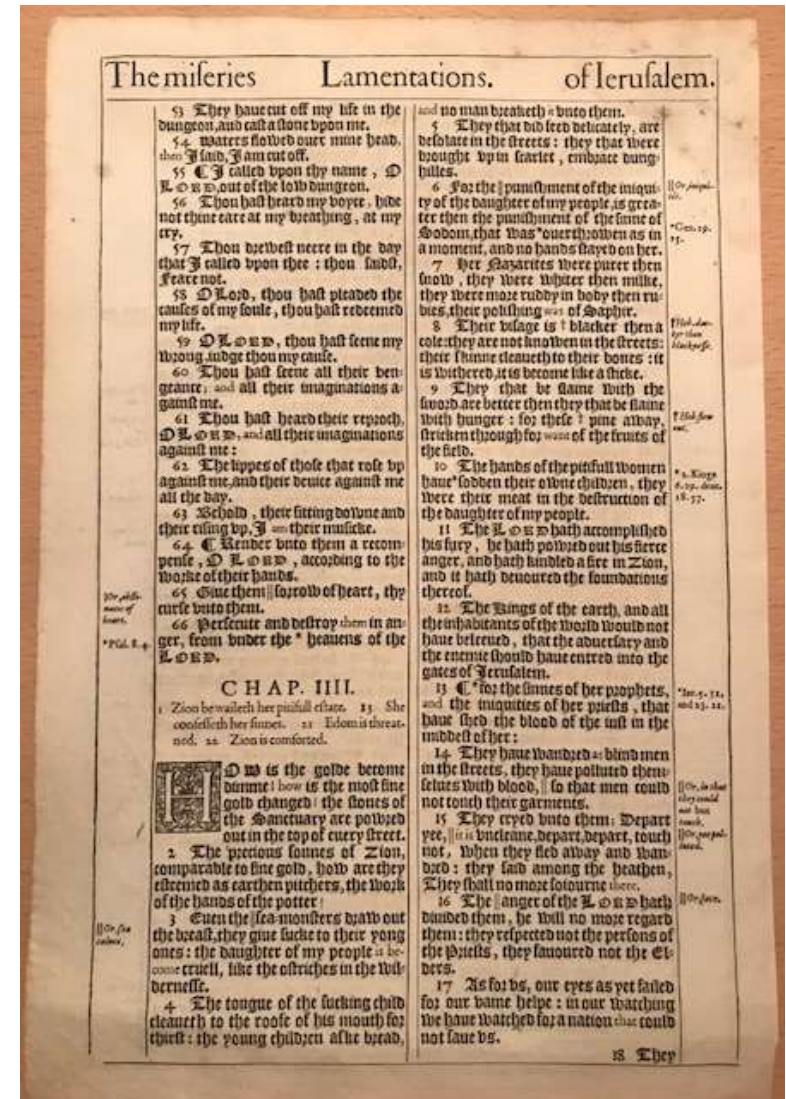

 (Herbert #309)

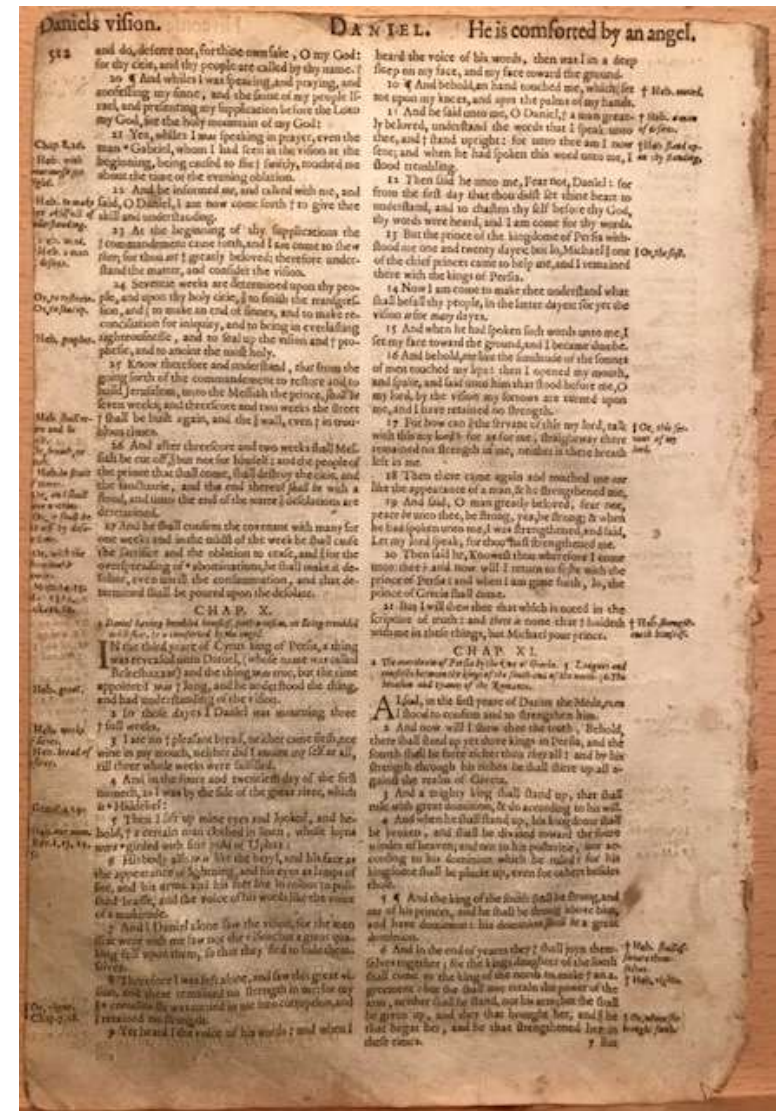


KJB Second Edition

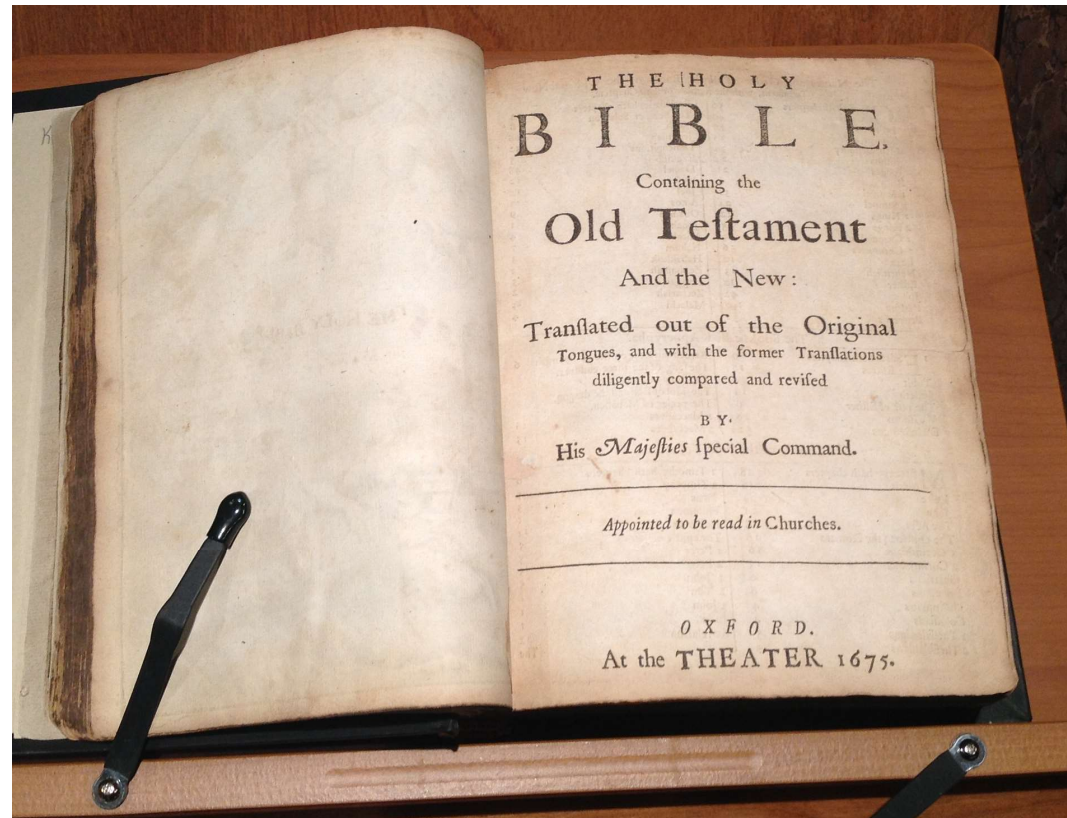

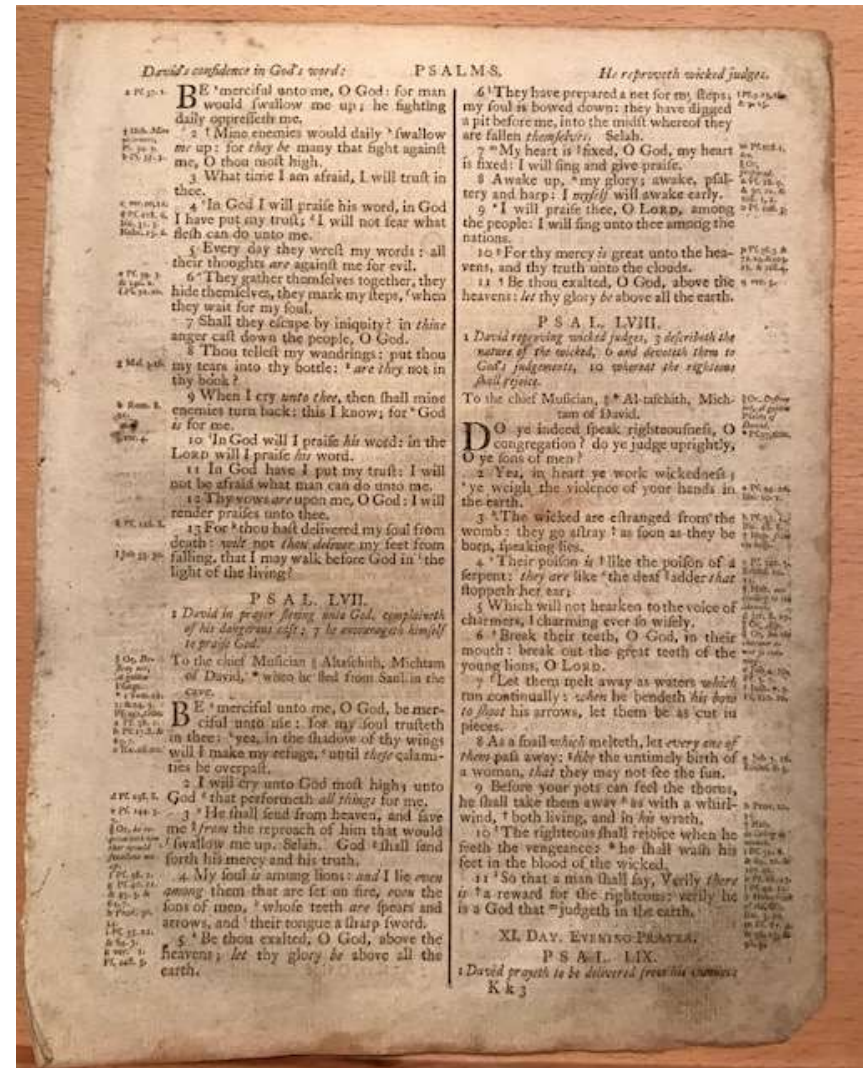

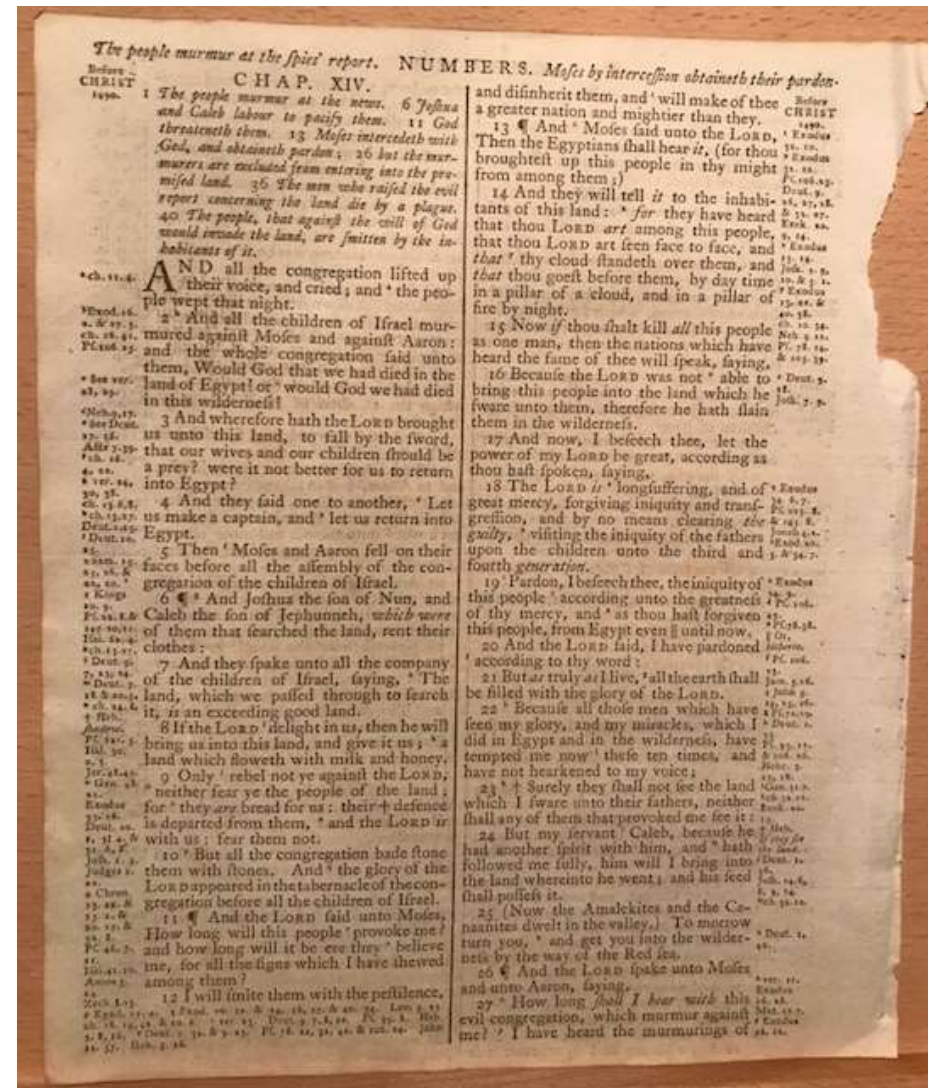

“The plainest Englishmen, therefore, can understand my principles – my chief point: can understand that he ought to confide in the text of his Bible, as in a physician’s prescription: and ought to take equal care that no one ‘correct’ it, while he is on his way to profit by it: that what a body of learned men have publicly agreed upon, a few learned men in a corner ought not alter; and that a public document should not be tinkered by a private hand”
