Constantine The Great (AD 272-337)

- Acclaimed Emperor upon his father's death in York AD 307
- Ruled the Roman Empire from 307-337
- Worshipped the Sun god Mithras, but was brought up to regard the God of Christians with favour.
- Had a vision before the Battle of Milvian Bridge (313) "In this sign conquer"
- Edict of Milan (313) exempted Clergy from military & municipal property from taxation. Established a Gold standard to combat inflation
- Saw himself as a "bishop of bishops"
- Set up Byzantium as the New Rome (Constantinople) when Rome refused to accept the new religion
- Did not accept baptism until right before his death in 337



Period 3.a. Arianism

1. Reference: Jn.4:6, Matt. 24:36
2. Essential Theory, Belief, or Practice: A. The Son was created out of nothing; hence, he is different in essence from the Father; that he is Logos, Wisdom, Son of God, is only of grace. He is not so in Himself. B. there was a time when he was not; i.e., he is a finite being.
3. Principle Character: Arius, a presbyter of the Alexandrian Church, was taught in Antioch. He was refuted by Athanasius who emphasized the *Personality* of the Son. This was “settled” at the Council of Nicea 325.
4. Scriptural Refutation:
 - a. Jesus is God Jn. 10:30, 20:28, Ti. 2:13, Heb.1:8,
 - b. He is truly human – Rom.1:2-4, 1 Jn.4:2-3, Lk. 19:41, Jn. 19:28
 - c. He claimed the Divine name (Jn.8:58) and did things only God can do Mk.2:1-12, Lk. 7:48-50, Rom.10:9, 2 Jn.1:7
 - d. God the Son became a man Jn.1:1,4,14; Heb.2:17, Gal.4:4-5. He will forever possess two distinct, yet inseparable natures.
