Verses 6-7:

6 Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, (1 Cor. 12:28, Eph. 4:11) whether prophecy, *let us prophesy* according to the proportion of faith; (1 Cor. 14:3)

7 Or ministry,

let us wait on our ministering: (Ac. 6:4, 1 Cor. 16:15, 2 Tim. 4:5) or he that teacheth, on teaching; (Col. 1:28, 2 Tim. 2:24)

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Verses 8-9:

8 Or he that exhorteth,

#38 Dissimulation. This word appears twice in the KJB.

Rom. 12:9 "Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good."

Gal. 2:13 "And the other Jews dissembled likewise with him; insomuch that Barnabas also was carried away with their dissimulation."

Dissimulation first appeared with TYN and all the prescribed reference texts follow at Rom.12:9. The KJB translators provide it at Gal. 2:13. Earlier editions of GEN also have dissimulation at that location. See Table 38 below.

15 Unique Word - Dissimulation

Strong's Greek Dictionary 505. ἀνυπόκριτος anypókritos, *an-oo-pok'-ree-tos* from <u>G1</u> (as a negative particle) and a presumed derivative of G5271; undissembled, i.e. sincere:—without dissimulation (hypocrisy), unfeigned. Adjective. *The Gk* ἀνυπόκριτος *appears six times in the TR and translated once as be without dissimulation at Rom.12:9; as unfeigned four times at 2 Cor.6:6, 1 Tim.1:5, 2 Tim.1:5, and 1 Pet.1:22. It appears once as without hypocrisy at Js. 3:17 in the KJB. JW.*

Strong's Greek Dictionary 5272. (hypókrisis) ὑπόκρισις hypókrisis, hoop-ok'-ree-sis from G5271; acting under a feigned part, i.e. (figuratively) deceit ("hypocrisy"):—condemnation, dissimulation, hypocrisy. feminine noun. The Gk ὑπόκρισις appears seven times in the TR and transliterated five times as hypocrisy at Matt.23:28, Mk. 12:15, Lk.12:1, 1 Tim.4:2, and 1 Pet. 2:1 (plural). It appears as condemnation at Js.5:12, and as dissimulation at Gal.2:13 in the Gal.2.13
